Cinema Italiana

Art lives through the people who view it. Without an audience, art (movies, sculpture, theatre, music, paintings -the lot) are reduced to meaningless private entities, like family photographs. Through turning on our radios we make musicians famous, by going to the theatre, we play our role in the success of the creative world.

It would be untrue to say that Italian cinema is underappreciated. In the last 75 years, dozens of <u>academy awards</u> have recognised the excellence of the Italian film industry. Over the decades Italy has churned out great films such as Ladri di Biciclette (1948) (pictured on the front cover), La Dolce Vita (1960), Un Giorno Particolare (1977) and La Grande Belezza (2013). Famously, the frequently used English word paparazzi comes from Fellini's La Dolce Vita.

Rome's <u>Cinecitta</u>, is the largest cinema complex in all of Europe. More than 3000 films have been shot at Italy's Hollywood on the Tevere river, including Netflix's Oscarnominated Two Popes in 2019. On a summer evening in Rome, it is not difficult to stumble across one of the open-air cinemas created to support the film industry.

The recent release of Mario Mattone's Nostalgia, an intimate story about a man returning to his home City of Napoli, starring Pierfrancesco Favino, was celebrated in both Johannesburg and Cape Town to extremely positive reception.

Italian film has rich roots that it will never lose. However, in recent years, the industry has been in a difficult position, particularly <u>economically</u>. There could be many reasons for this, with Covid in pole position.

Some argue that the directors from the golden years of Italian cinema are no longer with us. It could be the advent of online content has disrupted box office revenues. It could be the fairly limited global demand for the Italian language.

The fantastic opportunity of the <u>Italian film course</u>, hosted by the Italian Institute of Culture, featured later in this newsletter, is a great opportunity for you to learn more about this rich thread of Italian history. Moreover, it is an opportunity of entertainment and discovery of the wonderful history of Italian cinema. Viva il cinema!

Cos'è Ferragosto?

15 August

Ferragosto is a holiday widely celebrated in Italy, dating back to the Roman Empire. It derives from the latin expression 'Feriae Augusti' (The holiday of Augustus), and indicates a celebration. It is the symbol of summer holidays in Italian culture, marking the eventual end of summer, with schools commencing shortly after and life returning to a usual workflow after the summer months.

In 18BC, Emperor Augustus was seeking to gain visibility and appreciation across society. In order to do this, in his namesake's month, he declared the first day of the month a rest day, following the weeks of hard work harvesting fields. On this day in ancient times, all workers were given a due break, as draught animals such as donkeys and oxen were free from work, and were dressed up in flower garlands, while workers were able to present their wishes to landlords and traditionally would receive some compensation. It was characterised by horse races, feasts, and festivities across the empire.

The Feriae Augusti was strongly associated to the Consualia, the Roman holiday dedicated to Consus, the god of fertility and soil. The Consualia also celebrated the end of agricultural work in the fields, coinciding with the beginning of a rest period for workers and farmers. The connection between Augustus and the Divine was strengthened by pairing a traditional divine celebration with his own newly-instituted holiday.

Like many Italian holidays, Ferragosto was originally associated with a specialised menu. In the past, it was customary to prepare roasted pigeon with rice, or salsiccia with porcini in the northern regions, whereas in the south a more traditional meal would be orecchiette with cime di rapa, or pasta Chijna.

In modern days, Ferragosto is the epitome of Italian summer, a day spent with friends and family, usually in the sun, and for the lucky ones by the sea, eating delicious food, and soaking up the end of a beautiful season.

North-South Corridor

Under the Global Gateway

Presentation of the NSC study commissioned by the EU

The European Union - through the Global Gateway Africa-Europe Investment Package - has prioritised the establishment of "strategic, sustainable and secure transport corridors" in Africa; and is looking for ways to support investment in multi-country infrastructure and to improve the policy, regulatory and institutional framework that is necessary to ensure effective connectivity across 11 priority corridors.

The North-South Corridor serves as one of Southern Africa's foremost arteries for development, and as one of the region's most intractable problems. The corridor is an essential conduit for regional trade in Southern Africa, and a key gateway for trade with the European Union and the rest of the world. The EUD to Pretoria has been appointed as the champion to develop the EU strategy for this specific corridor. We would like to introduce more to all of you about the corridor.

With this corridor on mind, The EUD through the (EU-SA) Partners for Growth Programme commissioned an study to Christopher Wood in order to provide EU Business and the EU Delegation with a complete and accurate assessment of the main challenges confronted by traders across the North-South Corridor with a short-list of actions that can be incorporated into the immediate advocacy efforts of EU Business and the longer-term development plans of the EUD.

The study is just an initial demarche of the activities incoming within the corridor. We would like to present all of you the results of the study in an open discussion. **Watch this space!**
